FOR PARTS  
1 AND 2**

**Listen carefully** to the questions you are asked. The first few questions are always the same, so this will help you to start. The questions in Part 1 will be about you – what you do, your likes and dislikes, etc. Some questions will be the same for you and your partner. Some will be different for each of you.

**Don't prepare long answers** before the exam. You can prepare the first two phases and give answers you have practised, but in the third and fourth phases you will be asked different questions.

**Don't give very short answers** to the questions. Try to give reasons for what you say and make your answers longer. The examiners want to hear you talk.

**Don't speak for too long.** When you have finished what you want to say, come to a natural stop. The examiner will indicate when you have said enough by saying 'Thank you'.

**Don't worry** if you make a mistake. Try to correct it but remember it is more important to talk than to spend a long time thinking about what you want to say. If you don't understand something, ask the examiner to repeat. It is fine to say you don't know a word.
